April 14 was the day of Ambedkar's birthday. He is the light of the downtrodden.



His services were lauded by all the people who had attended the programme arranged in his memory on the day. The programme was arranged by the department of Political science and it was attended by all the teaching and non teaching staff of the college. Principal, Dr. P. Swapna Haindavi attended the programme as the Chief Guest. Principal, in her speech reminded the audience the hardships went into the making of Ambedkar. Sri Srinivasa Rao, Lecturer in Politics, said that Ambedkar never advocated reservations in employment and reservation of constituencies. He also went on to explain that he was opposed to imposition of Article 370 in Jammu&Kashmir, he wanted to make Sanskrit the official language of Indian Union. He also mentioned that his book, Waiting for a Visa was prescribed as text book at Columbia University. The portrait of Ambedkar was garlanded by all and rich floral tributes were paid to him on the occasion.
