We may be ordinary, middle class, powerless, but respect, integrity, and character always stand paramount. These qualities are more important than any other ideals, and freedom is the ultimate determinant of the quality of life one leads.

Freedom is allowed as long as it helps build relationships and brings people together. One does not have the freedom to disturb the freedom of others. Liberty, a word born of the French revolution, deserves more respect because it is meant to draw a line between work and slavery. You have liberty where your personal interests, time, physical

well-being, and financial health are all taken care of. Hence, you have the liberty to work for eight hours a day with minimum concomitant wages without any stress or other discomfort. Too much of anything will be detrimental to human life.

Living with fewer worries, eating fewer calories, and working for fewer but desired hours will result in better physical, mental, and psychological health. These are values. Knowledge is essential, yet understanding their real spirit and thus functioning will serve us better. LITERACY DAY

Literacy Day was celebrated on September 8 amidst the staff and students. The programme, which was presided over by Vice Principal Prasada Rao, dwelt on the relevance of the day. Speaking on the occasion, the vice principal bemoaned that literacy is still a faraway dream for many.

Dr. Surya Rao, lecturer in Economics, spiked at length on the topic. He stated that literacy day was established by UNESCO in 1966 to remind the public of the importance of literacy as a matter of dignity and human rights. He explained that illiteracy is a global problem and that over 750 million people in the world who are illiterate underscore the scourge of the problem. He said that the U.S. is not without its share of ugly things, adding that it has 30 million people without literacy.

In his speech, Bhaskara Rao, lecturer in Commerce, averred that literacy is light and it sheds darkness in the lives of people. Literacy, according to him, is the panacea to all social evils, and literacy is not the mere learning of letters. He said that real literacy understands the spirit behind those letters.

Malleswararao, lecturer in history, narrated that wiping out illiteracy from every local community is the goal of celebrating International Literacy Day. He said that we cannot imagine a world where people cannot read and write and said that literacy is the way to success and glory, no matter whether it is the individual or the nation.

Srinivasa Rao, lecturer in Politics, said that while the literacy rate in India stands at 74.04%, it was a mere 12% in 1947. In spite of the increase in literacy rate, modern India is now witnessing an increase in crime rate and denigration of all kinds, he said, adding that literacy means learning the right kind of behavior and morals.



The programme was attended by boys and girls from the college, teaching and non-teaching staff.

MEETING AT V.S.KRISHNA COLLEGE

On the occasion of his jayanti on 21.9.22, Gurajada was paid rich floral tributes. Gurajada Venkata Apparaao is one such name that does not need any introduction. His efforts, along with Gidugu, to free Telugu from the classical chains are matchless. He wrote his play, "Kanysulkam," in the language of the common man. Kanyasulkam will be remembered not only for its language, but also for its campaign to rid society of a social evil.





The programme arranged on the occasion saw the presence of all the staff and students. The programme was conducted by Chowdhury Tarakeswar Rao, lecturer in Telugu. Dr. Swapna Haindavi, speaking on the occasion, pointed out that Vizianagaram is famous for fine arts , music and literature and said that Gurajada, Ghantasala, Kodi Rammurty, and Aadibhatla have enriched their chosen fields.

Vice principal, Prasada Rao, said that Vizianagaram reminds people of names like Gurajada, Ghantasala, Aadibhatla, etc., and he mentioned that Maharaja Ananda Gajapathi of Vizianagaram was behind the endeavor of Gurajada. The king was of such a great heart that he ordered a survey on the evil of Kanyasulkam, which was widely prevalent in those days. He said that Gurajada, in his play Kanyasulkam, had drawn our



attention to social evils like Kanyasulkam, widow remarriage, child marriages, debauchery, the art of people like Gireesam, and those people who claim themselves to be the elderly of society.

Chowdari Tarakeswar Rao, lecturer in Teleugu, mentioned certain verses from "Puttadibomma poornamma", "Desamunu preminchumannna", etc., and explained their themes and beauty. He explained that many dialogues from Gurajada's Kanyasulkam have entered the common language of the people. They are worldly wise, he pointed out. And he quoted famous lines from Gurajada's Kanyasulkam.

The program, which was presided over by the principal, was attended by teaching staff and students.

NSS DAY CELEBRATIONS

On 24.9.22, the college celebrated NSS Day on the college grounds. The programme was organized by Bhaskar Rao, a lecturer in Commerce who is also an NSS officer. The Vice Principal, speaking on the occasion, explained the importance of NSS. It teaches the importance of serving society. The NSS volunteers serve as a tool to disseminate knowledge among the illiterate and dispel superstitions. Students undertake campaigns in villages and bring about change. Tarakeswar Rao said that NSS volunteers had worked wonders in the area of spreading literacy among the villagers. He said campaigns on child marriages, healthy food for children and women, and protections of the environment have yielded good results, he said.



Malleswararao, lecturer in history, narrated the history of NSS. He recalled that the NSS was founded on September 24, 1969, by V.K.R.V. Rao, the then-education minister. Initially, it was started in 37 universities, with an enrollment of 40.000 volunteers. Now he said that there are about 4 million volunteers. Srinivasa Rao, lecturer in politics, remembered his experiences as a volunteer at college and camps where he actively participated.

Venugopalarao, Lecturer in English, said that NSS was contemplated in those days with a view to making the programmes reach every nook and corner. In spite of spending crores of rupees, the fruits of government programmes are not reaching the people in need. Hence what governments could not do was planned to be achieved by NSS volunteers.

NATIONAL INTEGRATION DAY

Certain people are of the moment. Certain others are forever. They are remembered for generations. Sardar Vallabhai Patel was one such man. He was a trusted lieutenant of Mahatma Gandhi who participated in the Indian struggle for independence.
